

HOSPITAL BUS SERVICE

In the last two months since the John Radcliffe hospital opened many people have complained about the difficulties of getting there.

It is not just the unreliability of the bus service but the long walk getting to the bus stops. For the people of Jericho/Walton Manor area the walk through to Banbury Road and then the wait for a half hour service is too much for them. The alternative is to wait for a bus down to St. Aldates and change (5p for pensionners but 12p for anyone else, and then another fare to the hospital). True, once you get to St. Aldate's there are three services. That is getting there, then one has to get back and the round journey can add up to nearly two hours.

For anyone not in the best of health it can be gruelling. Even for perfectly healthy visiters it is a long trek at the end of the day and not all visiters are young and active. Old people want to go and see their relations and friends just as much, if not more, than young people.

The Jericho Residents' Association Committee have already written to the South Midland Bus Co. asking if they can help. They got a long letter back pointing out all the difficulties which are why they can do nothing.

What about a minibus service? They are used in some country areas, with volunteer drivers, so there is no

legal reason why not.

A minibus running from Gloucester Green, up Walton St., Kingston, Hayfield and Bainton Roads, then Beechcroft Road to the Marden Ring Road would serve Jericho, Walton Manor, St. Margaret's and parts of Summertown. Cost? Well that would have to be looked at but why should a small bus, full of passengers, driven by a volunteer or part time driver cost more than an every half hour, quarter full, double decker driven by a full time driver? We are not asking for a free service. Just four runs a day, there and back. Two in the morning, one in the



Winter. Christmas. Frosty days. Snow. "ou can enjoy winter if you are warm but it is hell if you are cold and worried to leath about how you are going to pay. What is more there is not going to be any discount scheme for your electricity bills this year, only a flat rate on supplementary and other benefits.

So what can you do about it? The City Council have asked us to draw your attention to the Pay-as-you-go schemes run by the Gas and Electricity Boards. There are four difference ones and the staff at the Showrooms will help you decide which is best.

1) You can pay an agreed amount each week, or month, towards the bill.

2) You can buy saving stamps at the Showrooms.

3) You can arrange to pay what you can, when you can, towards the next bill. Not for everyone but it may suit some people.

4) You can have meters installed, if it is safe and practicale. Warning. This can cost more.

These schemes are designed to spread the cost but of course they don't help when you really cannot pay. If you are a breadwinner getting Supplementary Denefit or a household of OAP's you may get help from the Social Security Office. Families with children under 11, or getting Family Income's Supplement can go to the Council's Social Services Department. They will look into your case. But PLE SE tell the Gas or Electricity Board too. It stops them getting the wires

Afraid of Being Cut Off?

If you have agreed to make regular payments and keep you bargain without running un a bill you cannot possibly pay you are O.K.

You can have a meter installed, adjusted to clear your debt.

A household of OAP's cannot be cut off between 1st Oct. and 31st March unless they are wilfully refusing to pay.

You cannot be charged with someone else's debt if you took the supply over properly. You cannot be cut off for a hire purchase debt. The Board's have to have an Entry Warrent if you are not at home so you will not come home and find it is off.



'Because?'




'There you are! You naughty gir. I told you to hold my hand; and I told you not to talk to strangers.

BRITISH RAIL AND JERICHO


Did you see the article about British Hail's ideas for the devlopment of the land west of the canal. See the map below. It was in The Oxford Times of 13th October.

What di you think about it? At least they are honest about it. Its the money they are after. Commercial development 'with maximum sale or rental value and, if possible, one that will generate rail traffic. We need as much money as possible to invest in a station worthy of Oxford'. They also feel that 'It would be appropriate for a third party to build some form of visitor accommodation, perhaps a conference centre'.

What does all that add up to? Maximum sale or rental value that will generate rail traffic. That has to be industry. Fairly heavy industry at that if they need to move the goods by rail. The third party to build the visitor accommodation? Could that be the Americans, or Japs, or Arabs that they have sold the sites to? Though what we want with another Conference Centre is a puzzle. With all the Colleges letting rooms for conferences during the vacations surely Oxford is amply provided. They are not thinking of having the political ones here are they? A station worthy of Oxford. The mind boggles. St Panctas with multi-storey car parks each end? All the people of Oxford ask is clean trains, running to time, clean loos and clean, eatable snacks. Not a shopping concourse with three prices of British hail catering and soft-pron bookstalls.

What could such a scheme mean to Jericho? No open spaces to the west of us. No direct access to Port Meadow. Factories, traffic, new approach roads, more traffic, more trains, more noise. No canal to take the dog along. They may leave the path but you bet they will 1 indscape it. You know. Cut down the willows and replace them with depressed looking trees in wire cages and litter bins spilling rubbish. Then of course industry will want better access roads. Through Jericho? More parking. In Jericho? More housing for workers. Multistorey blocks in Jericho?

So far the City Council have turned down all BR's plans but for how much longer. We need positive action to avert this threat. Education is Oxford's biggest and most profitable industry and students travel and Oxford is always short of space for them so why should not the City Cou cil and the University join together to buy the site. After all it is one of the last big central sites left. Then they can build all the student accommodation, graduate flats, language schools and other institutions which are, at present, gobbling up our homes and living spaces. Buskin College, for example, could take their extension there, its not too far for the students to walk.
